         The purpose of this meeting,
22
     I'm going to go over the format
23
     of how we're going to proceed.
     We're going to identify -- we did
24

     a roll call.
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1	The purpose of this meeting
2	is to receive public comments on
3	the proposed rules. Secretary
4	Pierson is going to give us an
5	overview of the rules, which was
6	published in the May 2018
7	Louisiana Register. Comments and
8	questions from the board members
9	will then be entertained and
10	responded to. Comments and
11	questions by the public will be
12	heard, and I believe we have 15
13	people that want to make
14	comments. 15 to 20, so I think
15	we can give people three minutes
16	for their comments to be made. I
17	would encourage people to stay on
18	point, and, if possible, not to
19	be repetitive of what may have
20	been said before unless you just
21	want to come up and say ditto,
22	you know, I agree with what the
23	previous individual said because
24	once the comment is made it's
25	received and understood and



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1	valued by us.
2	Upcoming dates and deadlines.
3	June 22nd is the deadline to
4	submit written comments and they
5	are submitted to the Department.
6	On June 25th at 9:30 LED will
7	hold a public hearing pursuant to
8	the Administrative Procedures
9	Act. All of the board members
10	are invited to attend and all
11	public are invited to attend and
12	do value the input that is given.
13	On June 27th at the Board of
14	Commerce and Industry regular
15	meeting include full board
16	consideration to move forward and
17	approve the proposed change
18	changes, and then we will adjourn
19	from today's meeting. So that's
20	kind of the overview.
21	As you guys know, our first
22	meeting was seven hours. We do
23	not intend to be here for seven
24	hours. With 20 comment cards I
25	don't think we could be here for



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1	20 hours I mean, seven hours,
2	so with that I'm going to give
3	the floor to our illustrious
4	secretary, Mr. Don Pierson.
5	MR. PIERSON:
6	Thank you, Mr. Windham. Don
7	Pierson. Secretary of Louisiana
8	Economic Development. Thank you
9	for your attendance today and the
10	process and the proposed rules.
11	This is an important date, one of
12	two public hearings that we'll
13	conduct, and we are looking
14	forward to receiving public
15	comments on the proposed rules.
16	We want to make sure that we stay
17	on that topic regarding the
18	proposed rules. Would also note
19	that this meeting is being video
20	recorded so that we will be able
21	to post it on a link providing a
22	full accounting for board members
23	or others, members of the public
24	that are not available here
25	today. I understand that the



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1	technical capacities that we have
2	will be recorded, processed today
3	turned over to LED tomorrow,
4	possibly, so the link should be
5	up and live. I will tell you by
6	Thursday we'll do our very best
7	to make that a quick and
8	efficient process.
9	Proceeding now with just a
10	quick recap of the proposed
11	rules, what we seek to achieve
12	through their adoption, this, of
13	course, was done in concert with
14	many conversations with many
15	stakeholders from the month of
16	December through March and
17	beyond. They continue today,
18	actually, but what we arrived at
19	would be a much improved program,
20	in my opinion, and the features
21	of that are that the Exhibit A,
22	which is the pledge by the
23	corporation which is seeking an
24	exemption of what they will
25	provide to the community, and



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1	that will be in terms of their
2	proposed capital expenditures
3	investment that they will make.
4	It will be in terms of the number
5	of jobs they will make available,
6	the wages that is associated with
7	those jobs. That include a
8	healthcare benefit, by the way,
9	and also the term of the
10	agreement, which would be of ten
11	or more years. The previous
12	Exhibit A was a much lengthier
13	document. We sat down in concert
14	with stakeholders, reviewed it
15	and tried to bring about a more
16	user friendly document, and I
17	believe that the agreement now is
18	approximately 50 percent less
19	number of pages than the previous
20	edition. If I'm not mistaken it
21	went from something like 26 to
22	13.
23	The next major feature of the
24	proposed rules will change the
25	yield of the program. As you may



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1	recall, the constitutional
2	created Industrial Tax Exemption
3	program at a ten year one hundred
4	percent exemption, and from a
5	community stakeholder viewpoint
6	that meant revenues from that
7	investment millage's would begin
8	to come to the community in year
9	eleven.
10	Governor John Bel Edwards
11	enacted an executive order which
12	changed the yield to a five year
13	one hundred percent abatement
14	followed by a three year term at
15	an 80 percent abatement. If you
16	do calculations around that that
17	yield is approximately 75 percent
18	of the previous program, and
19	associated with that specific
20	yield revenues begin to flow to
21	the community in terms of millage
22	receipts in year six. With the
23	adoption of this rule change, the
24	yield will become ten years at 80
25	percent abatement given the



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community's impacted opt end.
Those being the sheriff, the
school board, parish government
and the case of municipality,
participating municipality. So
it's a significant change, and
when revenues began to flow to
the community from year eleven to
year six to now proposed that the
community impacted by the
investment would begin to receive
revenues in year one.
Finally, the important
element of the local voice, and
these characteristics that are
represented in the proposed rule
changes don't change.
Accountability feature that was
placed into this by the Governor
remains the same represented by
Exhibit A, the agreement, and
also the local voice as to
choosing whether to participate
in the abatement or not remains
with those governmental agencies.



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1	What changes is the process.
2	Previous to now, this board was
3	accepted completed applications
4	which included both Exhibit A and
5	Exhibit B. Exhibit B being the
6	grouping of adopted resolutions
7	coming from the school board, the
8	parish government and a letter
9	indicating support or not support
10	from the sheriff. At that point
11	the local government agencies
12	were required to evaluate and
13	then pass or not pass a
14	resolution of support.
15	In the new set of rules, the
16	Board of Commerce and Industry
17	backed by the LEDC staff will
18	fully evaluate all of the
19	proposals as we have in the past,
20	and they will include Exhibit A,
21	and then this board will then
22	provide what I will refer to as
23	initial approval. In other
24	words, the approval of board
25	after review that the proposed



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1	investment meets the
2	qualifications manufacturing job
3	creation or retention, etc., and
4	then we would provide immediate
5	notice to all of the impacted
6	agencies and include a new
7	addition on that list of
8	notification to the assessors.
9	Upon notification, the local

10 governmental agency has 30 days 11 in which to act if they seek to 12 have discourse regarding 13 consideration of this they can move to have it placed on their 14 15 agenda within a 30 day timeframe 16 which should allow for the normal cycle of public meeting for that 17 18 governmental agency and then 19 should the item be placed on the 20 agenda at the following meeting, 21 they will vote the request for 22 exemption up or down. 23 In this way within 60 days,

24 LEDC, the corporation, the public

25 know what the outcome of the



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1	proposed exemption is. In fact,
2	if no action is taken by any of
3	the governmental agencies then it
4	indicates their support, and
5	within 30 days it is possible to
6	communicate that certainty of the
7	exemption to a corporation.
8	The communities and
9	governmental agencies can rely on
10	the evaluation and the
11	qualification of the program
12	coming to them for consideration
13	as it is pass muster both with
14	LEDC and Board of Commerce and
15	Industry, so we're trying to
16	place the evaluation process, the
17	analysis process in the hands of
18	the professionals and simply
19	allow the local communities to
20	determine whether or not they
21	choose to participate in the
22	abatement.
23	That is the general rundown
24	of the proposed rules. Certainly
25	if there are more technical



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1	questions we'll be prepared to
2	entertain those from you today,
3	but they have been provided at
4	the opportunitylouisiana.com
5	website, and you can click there
6	to see a marked up set of the
7	rules for those that would seek
8	to have specific technical
9	questions resolved.
10	In a moment I will open up
11	the first opportunity for
12	comments and questions by the
13	board, but I would like to take
14	this moment to read into the
15	record the receipt of written
16	communications that have come to
17	the Department expressing support
18	for these proposed rule changes.
19	Each one of these letters
20	indicates support and urges the
21	Board of Commerce and Industry to
22	adopt these rules. A number of
23	them also suggest changes that
24	they would like to see in the
25	future. I believe that a well



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1 run organization should always be 2 reviewing its programs, and so I would hope that we would continue 3 4 to consider changes to programs, and that includes continue review 5 6 and possible revision in the 7 future of this, but I would also 8 be mindful that we have a carefully crafted compromise of 9 10 many good ideas and suggestions that is on the table today and 11 that what I will call this 12 13 program is ITEP 2.0 in that it's 14 the next version following the 15 Governor's executive order, and 16 that in the future you would 17 propose revisions to this set of 18 rules, and I would call that ITEP 19 3.0, so with that said, again, a 20 number of these organizations may have included comments that I 21 22 would attribute to ITEP 3.0, but these are all inclusive of 23 24 language that says I urge the 25 Board of Commerce and Industry to



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1	adopt these proposed rules as
2	soon as possible.
3	I will now read these into
4	the record and we will have the
5	written copies available. We're
6	going to put them together
7	electronically into a PDF file
8	and they will be available for
9	inspection, and they will be
10	provided as appropriate in
11	compliance with the
12	Administrative Procedures Act as
13	well.
14	A reminder that this doesn't
15	end the period for written
16	comments. We will continue to
17	receive those through 22 June.
18	I will now quickly read
19	through these. In support,

4	individuals, elected officials
5	that have during this first 30
6	day timeframe from the 25th of
7	April when the rules were posted
8	have reviewed and expressed
9	support, and, again, I would
10	indicate that as you review
11	letters you will likely see on a
12	number of them that they do have
13	suggestions for ITEP 3.0, but at
14	this time urge the board to adopt
15	the rules as proposed.
16	That concludes the reading of
17	the written comments into the
18	record that we have received so
19	far at LED, and at this time I
20	would entertain comments and
21	questions by the board.
22	MR. WINDHAM:
23	Thank you, Mr. Secretary. Do
24	any of the board members have
25	questions of the secretary



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1	concerning the proposed changes?
2	MR. JONES:
3	One question. Mr. Pierson,
4	you had mentioned that the rules
5	will allow for municipality which
6	may be in the parish to weigh in
7	on the issues, and I should know
8	the answer to this and I do not.
9	If a municipality is not
10	receiving ad valorem taxes do
11	they have the ability to have a
12	say in that matter or only those
13	municipalities that have passed
14	and receiving ad valorem taxes.
15	MR. PIERSON:
16	The exemption is focused on
17	millage's, so if the municipality
18	received no millage's, it would
19	be my understanding they would
20	not be a requirement for the
21	process.
22	MR. JONES:
23	Thank you.
24	MR. WINDHAM:
25	Any other questions by any of



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1	the board members? I believe this
_	
2	is a good move in the right
3	direction. I believe the changes
4	that are being proposed will
5	provide the ability for entities
6	to make calculated decisions and
7	at least put into the equation an
8	answer so that Louisiana can
9	compete across a variety of
10	industries. I think parts of the
11	past have been some of the
12	uncertainty for the industries as
13	they move forward with the
14	project, and many of us know that
15	have done this, Economic
16	Development for a very long time,
17	it is an elimination process, so
18	as projects are considered by
19	businesses and industries, we
20	want to make sure that we stay on
21	the list, and the Governor's
22	office believe this is a good
23	move. It does allow entities to
24	receive dollars into the coffers
25	when project is announced in the



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1	beginning as opposed to waiting
2	until the six years, as the
3	secretary mentioned. It provides
4	a much thinned down legal
5	document that we believe in
6	reading it and from some of the
7	attorneys that I have spoken with
8	makes it a little more streamline
9	so that it doesn't have some of
10	the ancillary requirements that
11	may have been required before
12	just to be in compliance with the
13	document, you know, being a CPA,
14	so that is a really good thing in
15	there and it still gives the
16	locals the opportunity to express
17	their voice. It's just not on
18	the front end. It's after the
19	professionals, the companies, the
20	state have come together and
21	determine that the project is a
22	good investment from the state's
23	perspective. The economic
24	development developers at the
25	local level bring these projects



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1	to the communities and they are
2	the experts in that area. So the
3	other elected officials may not
4	have the experienced background
5	to make those decisions, so now
6	we're just lending a local
7	expertise, Board of Commerce and
8	Industry's input and voice into
9	the project and then giving the
10	locals the ability to voice their
11	approval or disapproval, but it's
12	given the companies a timeline
13	that they can work with. So
14	kudos to the staff for those
15	pulling these kind of rules
16	together. It is a compromise
17	from where we were before.
18	Any other questions or
19	comments from the board members?
20	All right. If there are any
21	members of the public who have
22	not submitted a card, I encourage
23	you to do so now so we can make
24	sure we hear your comments. You
25	can give them to Melissa or to



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Tham or to anyone on the front 1 2 row here on the right hand side. With that, we'll open this up 3 4 to the -- for the comments on the rules. 5 6 First I would like to invite 7 Mr. Jim Patterson representing 8 LABI. And I guess part of the 9 process here is so I don't have 10 to read everything and we don't 11 want to be repetitive. I will 12 invite your name up and you come 13 up and tell us who you represent 14 and what your comments are. Τf 15 possible, please keep it to three 16 minutes. 3	by thanking the secretary for
4	having reached out to us as well
5	as others within the business
6	community to solicit our input
7	regarding the program and the
8	need for changes to include that
9	program. We were pretty sure
10	that's not three minutes.
11	MR. WINDHAM:
12	No. That's not. Sorry.
13	MR. JONES:
14	Technology is good. User,
15	maybe not so good.
16	MR. WINDHAM:
17	We'll add a few more seconds.
18	MR. PATTERSON:
19	I appreciate that. A little
20	extra time at they say in soccer.
21	So we very much appreciate the
22	secretary for giving us this
23	opportunity for input. We do
24	believe that these changes are
25	going to improve the way that the



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1	program operates and make it more
2	attractive to certain industries,
3	and we very much want to
4	congratulate you on bringing us
5	to this point.
6	As you have indicated, there
7	is a desire for more change. We
8	did submit a number of pages
9	worth of changes that we thought
10	needed to be made, many of which
11	are not part of these changes,
12	and we understand those reasons,
13	but do look forward to working
14	with the secretary, the
15	administration, the board to
16	continue to improve the program
17	and make it more palatable to the
18	manufacturers.
19	We are concerned that with
20	the economic vibrance in our
21	country that Louisiana may not be
22	properly positioned to be a part
23	of that, and we don't want to
24	lose that opportunity, and we
25	think that this is an important



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1	step in that direction. We hope
2	to work with the legislature as
3	regards to changes coming forth
4	to make sure that we do no harm
5	in terms of the attractiveness of
6	our state to business development
7	expansion to the growth of jobs.
8	That is what we want to see
9	happen. We believe that this is
10	a good first step. And, again,
11	commend you, Mr. Secretary. We
12	thank you, the board, for
13	deliberating this, and we look
14	forward to, as I said, working
15	with you as we endeavor to
16	continue to improve this program.
17	Thank you.
18	MR. WINDHAM:
19	Thank you, Mr. Patterson.
20	Next we'll have Dale Powers. All
21	right. Thank you. Next we'll
22	have Tyler Gray. Tyler Gray in
23	the audience.
24	MR. GRAY:

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1	Mr. Secretary, Board of Commerce
2	and Industry members, my name is
3	Tyler Gray. I'm the general
4	counsel for the Louisiana Mid
5	Continent Oil and Gas
6	Association. Our membership
7	represents both refiners and L&G
8	companies in the state, and I am
9	here today, and I do apologize
10	for not submitting a comment
11	beforehand, but I do have a
12	letter that I would like to enter
13	into the record that basically
14	says we want to please urge
15	you-all to adopt these rules as
16	fast as possible. We do
17	recognize that there is an
18	opportunity to improve at some
19	places and we will submit
20	additional comments asking for
21	clarification in some areas of
22	the rules, but at this point we
23	do ask and urge you to adopt them
24	as soon as possible. Thanks so
25	much.

1	MR. WINDHAM:
2	Thank you, Mr. Gray. Next we
3	have Douglas Melancon.
4	MR. MELANCON:
5	Good morning. Douglas
6	Melancon. ExxonMobil employee.
7	I work in the environment group
8	at the Baton Rouge complex. I'm
9	a lifelong Louisiana resident.
10	Graduated from LSU, stayed in
11	Baton Rouge. My wife is a teacher
12	in the East Baton Rouge school
13	system. I live in Mid City and
14	I've raised two kids in Baton
15	Rouge and we are proud to be from
16	Baton Rouge. I urge you to
17	support LED's new guidelines.
18	This will encourage economic
19	development and make for a
20	predictable stable tax climate,
21	which is a key consideration for
22	companies considering future
23	investments. Continue economic
24	growth and prosperity depends on
25	a business environment that



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1	encourages capital investment and
2	creates jobs. I want Louisiana's
3	economy to prosper and grow.
4	ExxonMobil recently announced a
5	\$50 billion in plan investments
6	for the Gulf Coast. I want those
7	investments and opportunities to
8	come here to Baton Rouge. I want
9	to stay in Baton Rouge and I want
10	my children to stay in Baton
11	Rouge. We have to be we have
12	to be strategic. We have to be
13	competitive now to allow for
14	future growth and success.
15	Consider the jobs currently
16	created by ExxonMobil investments
17	in our area. Greater than 6,900
18	full time Exxon employees and
19	contractors consider the jobs
20	created by those jobs. These
21	jobs are the fuel that drive the
22	Baton Rouge economy.
23	Lastly, as a employee and
24	someone's whose entire career has
25	been spent in the environmental



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1	regulatory world, ExxonMobil is
2	committed to being a good source
3	of the environment. We
4	understand our responsibility to
5	this community and our commitment
6	to our right to operate. Thank
7	you.
8	MR. WINDHAM:
9	Thank you, Mr. Melancon.
10	Next we have David Hunagriff.
11	MR. FINK:
12	I am sorry I couldn't open
13	before the day I am Frank
14	Fink. I'm the Director of
15	Economic Development for St. Mary
16	Parish, and so I do appreciate
17	the fact you did send Don a
18	comment letter already and in
19	general we have some agreement,
20	but we also have we are going
21	to ask the board to consider
22	maybe some other things within
23	the new rules.
24	We do agree that the fact
25	that you shortened Exhibit A



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1	going down to 13 pages that we
2	hope that you will continue to
3	shorten that because we may have
4	Industrial Tax Exemption projects
5	with about 700,010 employees and
6	even the 13 page document would
7	be overwhelming to them, so we
8	hope that you consider shortening
9	that up. The proposal to adjust
10	the level, and the terms and the
11	magnitude is fine with us, we
12	don't have a problem with that.
13	The request we have is why now do
14	we have a top down process that's
15	proposed by the department by
16	the department and the C&I board.
17	The parish is a political
18	subdivision that offers the
19	Industrial Tax Exemption to
20	manufacturers as it is set. If
21	the benefits of that project in
22	our parish is seeking incentives
23	itself, we take a positive look
24	at it. Regardless of the state
25	still benefits from the



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manufacturing expansion through
sales tax and income tax
collections, the proposed process
does not recognize parish
leadership by going around parish
President directly to the parish
taxing authority. So what
suggestions would we like to make
to you. We'd like you to
consider that the parishes have a
local option to determine
expansion in your parish. The
state will still have the
responsibility to produce Exhibit
A and to monitor the process. 90
percent of the Industrial Tax
Exemption projects begin at the
parish level. The parish will
evaluate the benefits to the
incentive and the expansion as
positive. We will get our taxing
authorities to sign off and send
this to LEDC. This could take
off a lot of time in the process
and if LEDC approves of what we



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1	do in the Exhibit A is put in
2	place, we can go right ahead with
3	the C&I board approval and send
4	it on to the Governor for his
5	signature.
6	In St. Mary Parish, taxing
7	authorities have granted
8	authority by resolution to the
9	parish President to act on their
10	behalf if the parish level
11	benefits exceed the incentive
12	offer for the project and the
13	parish President must inform and
14	discuss with each taxing
15	authorities designee. In
16	economic development terms, the
17	benefits of the project. Other
18	parishes may have similar systems
19	in place or develop a local
20	option to facilitate, grant them
21	the Industrial Tax Exemption. If
22	offering is not satisfactory let
23	us suggest that the local option
24	be considered for all projects
25	that qualify for ITEP with a



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1	capital investment below \$10
_	-
2	million. This will alleviate the
3	burden of the secretary and the
4	C&I board of dealing with a much
5	smaller ITEP proposals. Thank
6	you.
7	MR. WINDHAM:
8	Thank you, Mr. Fink.
9	MR. HUNAGRIFF:
10	Thank you, sir. Thank you
11	secretary. My name is David
12	Hunagriff. I'm St. Mary Parish
13	President, and like Mr. Fink said
14	prior to that, in 2016 the
15	Governor signed the executive
16	order and I thought it was a good
17	thing. Having local input into
18	the process, which was tremendous
19	especially how we are truly the
20	one that are truly affected by
21	this. But in doing so I
22	recognize right off the bat the
23	pitfalls that we're dealing with.
24	As a businessman, I cringe at the
25	thought of my company or any



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1	other company having to go
2	between before each of these
3	tax entities and have to sit and
4	ask permission to get that
5	exemption because even through
6	this process as Frank Fink
7	mentioned, it becomes more beyond
8	the merits of what your review
9	the process of the application
10	which of of which you are
11	requiring, it becomes political,
12	so what we did was we went to
13	each and every taxing entity. The
14	five cities in St. Mary Parish;
15	the school board and sheriff and
16	the city and parish council, and
17	out of that the total of 48
18	individuals and only one voted
19	against it. They all gave me the
20	authority to use their authority
21	in deciding this, and, again, why
22	is this important because it
23	streamlines the process. It's
24	the best of both worlds. It
25	brings it to the local level and



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1	in that resolution I am required
2	to discuss and inform each
3	entity's designee, so everyone is
4	going to be informed what is
5	going on and instead of this
6	process taking 60 days, we can do
7	it in 14.
8	So I suggest looking forward
9	trying to combine the two, and
10	parishes that have resource,
11	parishes that are actually doing
12	what St. Mary Parish did can
13	streamline the process, getting
14	everyone on board, give that
15	authority to the Parish President
16	and with that parish having the
17	resources to their own analysis
18	at a certain level like Mr. Frank
19	mentioned, pick a number, ten
20	million, five million, allow us
21	to start the process from the
22	bottom up and continue this so we
23	can streamline for businesses.
24	Thank you.

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1	Thank you, sir. Next we have
2	Robert Berg.
3	MR. BERG:
4	Ditto.
5	MR. WINDHAM:
6	Thank you. Next we have Chad
7	Istre.
8	MR. ISTRE:
9	Good morning, everyone. I
10	like to say as Robert said ditto
11	and I am so happy this morning.
12	I'm Chad Istre. I'm an
13	ExxonMobil Employee for 20 years.
14	I am a 10th generation
15	Louisianian married to an 8th
16	generation Louisianian with two
17	Louisianian children and would
18	love to stay here. I'm so
19	pleased. Secretary Pierson what
20	you said, there is one foot that
21	sticks with me, not every change
22	is an improvement but every
23	improvement requires a change, I
24	love what you said. Every
25	organization needs to look at



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1	itself and make itself
2	continually better. I make
3	mistakes every day. I need to
4	keep doing better and better
5	until we get to eternity. And
6	Chairman Windham, I like what you
7	said that this is good
8	compromise. So I would say ditto.
9	I'm pleased with what y'all are
10	doing. I think some things in
11	life work, some things don't. And
12	I tell the story that when this
13	happened in 1936 when this was
14	first passed, and I asked people
15	and sometimes they know and
16	sometimes they don't. If
17	something is going on in the
18	world in 1936 there is a big
19	demand for fuel across the world.
20	Does anybody know what it was?
21	World War II, right. And our
22	grandparents and great
23	grandparents passed this tax
24	referral program to attract
25	business to give generational



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,	
1	jobs here in Louisiana. Four of
2	the five ExxonMobil facilities
3	that have never been built here
4	if it weren't for that case.
5	Picked up in 1963 where we would
6	have got Disney World but so be
7	it and let's not do that again.
8	80 years later when it is
9	overturned this is a compromise
10	to get it back. Maybe this is
11	2.0 and maybe some day we can get
12	that to 3.0. One of these boards
13	put together that we're now 12th
14	best in manufacturing
15	friendliness. We used to be No.
16	1. Who goes for the record? Who
17	goes to the 12th car dealership
18	to get the 12th best deal and is
19	happy about it. It's the same as
20	losing 11 times over. Let's put
21	Louisiana first again. Thank
22	you. Ditto. I appreciate you.
23	MR. WINDHAM:
24	Thank you. Next we have
25	Alexis Hector.



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1	MS. HECTOR:
2	Ditto.
3	MR. WINDHAM:
4	Thank you. Ms. Diane Haley
5	or Hadley?
6	MS. HANLEY:
7	Hanley.
8	MR. WINDHAM:
9	Hanley. I am so sorry.
10	MS. HANLEY:
11	My name is Diane Hanley and I
12	really appreciate having these
13	three minutes, and I thank you
14	for telling me that you value my
15	opinion. You are going to hear a
16	lot of different opinions from
17	mine, and so I would really like
18	mine in the record. I'm hoping
19	that you know the story of the
20	Emperors New Clothes, and if you
21	don't, I would tell you to please
22	read it tonight because this is
23	what is happening here today. We
24	are exposing ourselves to a story
25	that has been told for 80 years



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1	and we are having something woven
2	for us that is telling us that
3	there are jobs being created
4	through ITEP. These companies
5	are creating jobs and I'm glad
6	they have jobs but the way these
7	rules are written, it is saying
8	that whether there are jobs or
9	not, come on in and we'll give
10	you a break. 30 hours of work
11	for one week and we counted.
12	That's what's going on here
13	today. So I want you to know
14	when you read the story of the
15	Emperors New Clothes and you
16	think about that child that comes
17	forward and says, the Emperor has
18	no clothes, that's the citizens
19	of the state who are waking up.
20	I know there are experts in the
21	field. The experts are very
22	happy with these rules and there
23	is a reason and they will come
24	again and again. I'm not sure
25	who the compromise was with but



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1 it wasn't with me because I can 2 show you over and over again where these rules continue the 3 4 status quo. It's not changing If this is a requirement 5 things. 6 of jobs then the jobs will show up and we will see them, but if 7 8 you have to write the rules in a way so that it is so vaque about 9 10 new jobs coming along, we want 11 ten year jobs. We want jobs that 12 are going to last at least as 13 long as the exemptions, and these 14 are saying that they can have 15 jobs that are, you know, 30 hours 16 a week for one week, one month is 17 what this stands for, so I want 18 us to really consider what is the 19 truth of what is going on here 20 and to stop seeing things as if 21 they are clothes on us when they 22 are not. 23 I think we are allowing the

I think we are allowing the
proposed rules to create zero
real jobs and growth and even job



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1	cuts disguised as job gains. I
2	want y'all to look at this
3	honestly. The experts keep
4	telling us this is what you see,
5	this is what you see, but what
6	we're doing is exposing our
7	Emperor to what is not real. You
8	will have the testimony and you
9	can ask for more testimony about
10	what is really happening here.
11	Our recommendation is that the
12	revised rules should establish
13	clear stipulations for contract
14	labor, requiring that it be
15	counted on a full time equivalent
16	ten year basis to close the
17	phantom job loophole. We're also
18	asking that there be real
19	established return on investment
20	analysis that, Mr. Pierson, we
21	appreciate your 28 years of
22	service and the knowledge you
23	have in your heart and your head
24	but you may not be here forever
25	and we need to have these rules,



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1	these analysis come from the
2	experts that will corroborate
3	your statements of history and
4	knowledge, and we appreciate you
5	giving us that, but we want
6	analysis that will be in
7	statements that will be written
8	that we can look at ourselves.
9	If you are telling the locals you
10	are going to give it to us, give
11	it to us. We're asking for it.
12	We don't want it just being told
13	to us. As locals, as citizens
14	we're learning what we need to
15	learn about this ITEP program and
16	we're going to be calling out
17	that the Emperor has new clothes
18	when the Emperor has new clothes,
19	and we ask you as people who are
20	policymakers to look at this more
21	carefully, more closely and at
22	the analysis that we at Together
23	Louisiana are putting forth.
24	Thank you very much.
25	MR WINDHAM.

MR. WINDHAM:



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1	Thank you, Ms. Hanley. Mr.
2	Roger Bagert.
3	MR. BAGERT:
4	Good morning. My name is
5	Roger Bagert representing
6	Together Louisiana. After you
7	read the Emperors New Clothes I
8	encourage you to read the
9	proposed rules.
10	We don't have a problem with
11	the elements of this agreement of
12	policy choices made by the rules.
13	That's not what I want to testify
14	to today. We commented ourselves
15	to that. It's to drafting
16	choices or errors that muddy and
17	confuse things. The the sense
18	of urgency is real and it's
19	around the need for certainty and
20	clear expectations, and that's
21	not a need shared only by
22	applicant companies in the
23	business community. We all feel
24	that. We all want this thing to
25	be settled. But if there are



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1	areas of ambiguity that will not
2	only maintain but enhance
3	uncertainty then the process of
4	rushing this through to get it
5	done in August instead of
6	September won't meet the goal of
7	certainty, it will increase
8	uncertainty.
9	Give you three examples. On
10	the first page of the rules it
11	talks about when the new rules
12	are meant to apply and it says
13	this is under C3. It says, first
14	that after June 24, 2016 but
15	before June July 1, 2018 the
16	applicant has the option of
17	choosing between the rules
18	promulgated on June of 2017 or
19	the current rules that are about
20	to be promulgated, and the next
21	sentence says that applications
22	within advanced notice filed
23	after June 24th but before
24	October June 24, 2016 but
25	before October 21, 2016 thou



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1	shall be subject to the rules on
2	June 20, 2017. The second subset
3	is contained within the first, so
4	now we have a shall that is
5	directly in contradiction with
6	the previous sentence. That
7	wouldn't increase certainty, that
8	will increase uncertainty and
9	probably legal litigation.
10	Second around jobs, in the
11	Enterprise Zone Program jobs are
12	admirably defined. It says we
13	are going to establish a baseline
14	based on a 12 month prior
15	history. The current standard
16	for jobs includes job retention,
17	and here is what qualifies for
18	job retention, any investment,
19	quote, to employ best practice or
20	innovative state of the art
21	technology, any investment to
22	increase maximum capacity or
23	efficiency that is any investment
24	ever made because why would you
25	make an investment except to



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1	increase your maximum capacity.
2	Once that loophole is created
3	around retention, any job that's
4	at least 30 hours that doesn't
5	have a specified term, so if I
6	hire somebody for a week but I
7	haven't specified it's a week,
8	under these rules can be made and
9	understood to apply as equivalent
10	to a ten year full time job.
11	It's no longer a question of
12	whether that interpretation will
13	be made, it is being made.
14	Applications that have been
15	submitted to the Board of
16	Commerce and Industry already
17	include an I'm not going to
18	name the company because it's
19	beside the point here today, but
20	it's a public record, include job
21	creation of 257 new jobs since
22	December of 2017 to March of 2018
23	when there has been no new
24	hiring.
25	What's happening, contract



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1	jobs are being counted on an
2	apples to apples basis when it's
3	not apples to apples it's apples
4	to oranges.
5	Finally, there is a
6	requirement for return on
7	investment statement that was
8	originally put into the executive
9	order in the rules promulgated in
10	June of 2017. It is the position
11	of LEDC as expressed in an e-mail
12	to us through their executive
13	counsel that this return on
14	investment statement is not
15	required to be written or formal.
16	That it can be eyeballed. That
17	it can be judged by the
18	experience and intuition of the
19	secretary. We think that's an
20	untamable position. We think
21	that is not a sound basis by
22	which to establish whether to
23	grant public resources for
24	private purposes, and we think
25	it's the responsibility of this



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1	board to clarify that a return on
2	investment statement must be
3	based on a return on investment
4	analysis that is both written and
5	formal. Thank you.
6	MR. WINDHAM:
7	Thank you, Mr. Bagert. Next
8	we have Traci
9	MS. GREEN:
10	Green.
11	MR. WINDHAM:
12	Green. I'm sorry.
13	MS. GREEN:
14	Ditto to supporting LED.
15	MR. WINDHAM:
16	Thank you, ma'am. Jasmine
17	Payne.
18	MS. PAYNE:
19	Ditto.
20	MR. WINDHAM:
21	Thank you, Jasmine. David
22	Parker.
23	MR. PARKER:
24	I support ITEP. Thank you.
25	MR. WINDHAM:



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1	Thank you. Deborah Meaux.
2	Please, behind the yeah.
3	Thank you.
4	MS. MEAUX:
5	Good morning. I am Debbie
6	Meaux. I'm President of the
7	Louisiana Association of Educator
8	and I have been in education for
9	43 years.
10	First, thank you for allowing
11	me to speak. I am here today to
12	ask this board to consider the
13	negative impact of making local
14	school ad valorem tax money a
15	phantom promise leaving our
16	school system struggling to
17	provide the needs of children and
18	school employees why we continue
19	to keep wealthy corporate
20	companies from paying their
21	constitutional ad valorem taxes
22	to help support community
23	services and schools. I ask this
24	board to remove school districts
25	from the ITEP completely.



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1	Schools should not bear the
2	burden and the harmful effects
3	incurred through the non-payment
4	of tax money sorely needed by
5	every school district to pay the
6	employees, build or refurbish
7	school buildings and most
8	importantly give students
9	resources needed to become
10	successful in life. Louisiana is
11	the only state in the union that
12	shaves away local taxes from
13	schools. Mississippi doesn't do
14	it. Texas doesn't do it.
15	Arkansas doesn't do it. In fact,
16	Louisiana is the only state in
17	the country that raises its much
18	needed tax money to companies
19	that are wealthier and better off
20	than our school districts.
21	Though many will say that the
22	exemption it won't provide much
23	in the way of helping to fill the
24	needs of our school systems, we
25	all have to acknowledge it will



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be more than they correctly
 receive. And in a world of
 education every single dollar
 counts.

5 Over time as property returns 6 to the catch roles, the income 7 from these ad valorem taxes will 8 accumulate to provide a growing dollar amount. Our children here 9 in East Baton Rouge Parish school 10 district and children in all 11 12 school districts around the state 13 deserve every dollar we can put 14 to work for them. Additionally 15 our taxpayers who are always the 16 first that we go to when we need 17 money for our schools deserve a 18 break in the taxes they pay. If we removed school districts from 19 20 this tax exemption program all 21 together, we would be giving our 22 tax payers a break in what they 23 have to pay in order to educate 24 their children. Thank you.

MR. WINDHAM:



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1	Thank you, Ms. Meaux. Girard
2	Melancon, CP I am sorry, Ph.D.
3	Sorry, sir.
4	MR. MELANCON:
5	I was going to say my brother
6	is in the room, but he is in New
7	York City. Once again, Girard
8	Melancon. I am not a native
9	Louisiana, but before I get into
10	that, I'm currently the Executive
11	Director for WorkForce Education
12	at Baton Rouge Community College,
13	and I am also President of the
14	national council for workforce
15	education, so we have a 400
16	member community college
17	workforce develop group that I'm
18	President elect for, and I'm
19	really the envy of a lot of my
20	colleagues on the board. I also
21	was raised in the State of
22	Illinois. Funny, my dad is
23	Donald Melancon, which, by the
24	way, he found a stage someplace
25	in the common system of Illinois.



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1	I'm not sure if there is another
2	stage village at all, but I was
3	raised in the State of Illinois,
4	and growing up there, southeast
5	Chicago, the rust belt of the
6	Midwest, and I pray every day,
7	who my dad was the principal, he
8	died early, 63, and my mother is
9	still alive and she was a school
10	teacher of 43 years and she still
11	receives a state pension for
12	however long that is because the
13	state budget of Illinois is
14	horrendous because of no industry
15	and a lot of high migration.
16	I don't want to see that
17	happen here in Baton Rouge. I
18	also studied in Colorado for
19	seven years. I was groomed to be
20	a city manager. I understand the
21	role of ad valorem property tax
22	and how they can fund local
23	communities and systems and so
24	forth. But without a signal of
25	strong economic development and



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1	growth, nothing is going to grow.
2	We are in the workforce. These
3	part time jobs I have seen
4	firsthand, my unit is built
5	around industry base
6	certification with the unskilled
7	worker to a middle skilled
8	worker. Our economy is built
9	around middle skilled jobs. 20
10	percent unskilled, 54 percent
11	currently, 57 percent currently
12	middle skilled. Most of those
13	skills are industrial plants;
14	pipers, welders, instrumentation
15	techs, electricians, and so
16	forth. Working with Exxon right
17	now for the past four years or
18	so. We are rating unskilled
19	workers and moving them up in
20	north Baton Rouge community from
21	a laborer blaster painter to a
22	pipe fitter, electrician or
23	welder. We're doing that. People
24	are growing.
25	This industry there is no



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1	other industry that can do that.
2	It could be tech jobs and we
3	could be moving three people at a
4	
	time or anything else, mass skill
5	of movement of population,
6	industrial skill jobs is where
7	it's at.
8	So, in short, I support these
9	proposed changes and do it
10	quickly. The globe is watching
11	us. But to send a message across
12	the globe in that we are truly
13	open for business in Louisiana,
14	and I don't want to be a part of
15	and I really want to sustain from
16	becoming the new rust belt of the
17	south. Thank you.
18	MR. WINDHAM:
19	Thank you, Dr. Melancon.
20	Brad Allen. Brad I am sorry.
21	MR. ALLEN:
22	Thank you. My name is Brad
23	Allen. I'm with ExxonMobil. I am
24	the operations manager at our
25	Baton Rouge polyolefins plant on



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1	the north side of east Baton
2	Rouge. You can probably tell from
3	my accent I was not born here in
4	Louisiana. I'm not a 10th
5	generation but I'm definitely
6	proud to call it home and I plan
7	to stay here for many years. I
8	am a husband and two children
9	that I want them to have the
10	opportunity here in Baton Rouge
11	that I have had.
12	I support I think it's
13	important to really show support
14	for ITEP here.
15	Chairman Windham, you
16	mentioned earlier about the
17	competitiveness of our state, the
18	true mentality of ITEP. ITEP for
19	that, so I want to bring that to
20	a project that we're actually
21	considering here in East Baton
22	Rouge. I think Chad mentioned
23	already that ExxonMobil is
24	looking at a \$50 billion worth of
25	investment in the Gulf Coast.



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1	That's a pretty big number, and
2	we want a lot of that here in.
3	MR. WINDHAM:
4	We want all of it.
5	MR. ALLEN:
6	So at the polyolefins plant
7	we are on that. We are
8	considering a major investment as
9	an expansion of polypropylene. So
10	polypropylene, that is a plastic
11	product that goes in everything
12	from food containers to diapers
13	to wipes to medical scrubs to
14	automobiles, right. And
15	automobiles, that's a product
16	that helps lighten the vehicle
17	with high strength. Some of our
18	new technologies there. It
19	actually saves gasoline. Sounds
20	odd from an ExxonMobil guy saying
21	that statement, right. But for
22	us to be able to evaluate a
23	project such as that, we have to
24	have regulatory and tax
25	certainty, okay, to remain



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1 competitive.

2	So polypropylene is a product
3	that we make around the globe and
4	we make it right next door in
5	Texas as well. We have to remain
6	competitive with other states.
7	We when we're looking at a
8	project like this, I mean, the
9	amount of incentives that come
10	out of ITEP for us they can make
11	or break that product that
12	project, and we want that project
13	right here in our hometown.
14	So with no investment here, I
15	mean, it means no sales tax,
16	right, it means no jobs, it means
17	no increase to the long term
18	income tax base and to the long
19	term income property tax base, so
20	I said personally, I want the
21	company to invest here. I want
22	jobs here. I want growth here.
23	And I want a brighter future for
24	Baton Rouge and Louisiana. Thank
25	you for your time.



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1	MR. WINDHAM:
2	Thank you, Mr. Allen.
3	Gregory Bowser. He ditto that.
4	I'm assuming. Jessica Pranjic.
5	Pranjic. Please correct my
6	pronunciation.
7	MS. PRANJIC:
8	You had it right. It's
9	Pranjic.
10	So good morning. My name is
11	Jessica Pranjic. I am the
12	manager of communications and
13	workforce development with the
14	Greater Baton Rouge Industry
15	Alliance, and I am here today to
16	urge you to support these new
17	guidelines by LEDC, and we do
18	know that ITEP has successfully
19	served as an investment for
20	economic growth in our area, and
21	I would also like to this is
22	on multiplier effect on
23	manufacturing that for every one
24	manufacturing job required for a
25	project an additional eight to



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1	nine jobs beyond just direct
2	construction and contractor
3	employment is required to help
4	support that investment.
5	I would also like to bring up
6	the fact that industry in the
7	capital region does pay two
8	thirds of all property taxes
9	again in capital region, so,
10	again, I just want to urge
11	support of these new guidelines
12	to help enhance the
13	predictability for business
14	investment in the future. So,
15	thank you.
16	MR. WINDHAM:
17	Thank you. Russell
18	Richardson.
19	MR. RICHARDSON:
20	Good morning. My name is
21	Russell Richardson. I'm
22	representing the Baton Rouge Area
23	of Chamber. We serve as the
24	economic development organization
25	for the non-parish capital



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region.
ITEP is one of the most
important economic tools that we
use to attract and retain
business in capital region.
Since the executive order was
issued in June 2016 there's been
a great deal of uncertainty and
unpredictability around ITEP.
Without much structure and
guidelines it's been difficult
and local governments to
implement the program. The local
process is very widely between
the parishes since 2016 and in
some cases the program have
effectively been brought to a
standstill. These new rules more
clearly define the local input.
It provides a more simple and
straight forward approval
process. Providing a return on
investment statement and
recommendation to local taxing
authorities gives locals the

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1	information needed to make
2	responsible decisions for
3	companies considering investment
4	in our communities.
5	On behalf of our organization
6	and its 1,500 business we
7	represent, we ask you to adopt
8	the proposed rules on the fastest
9	available timeline. These rules
10	are a great step forward in
11	providing a more transparent and
12	predictable program which is key
13	to returning Louisiana and the
14	capital region to a competitive
15	location for new investment.
16	Thank you.
17	MR. WINDHAM:
18	Thank you, Mr. Richardson.
19	Stephanie Cargile.
20	MS. CARGILE:
21	Good morning. I'm Stephanie
22	Cargile. I'm the public affairs
23	manager at ExxonMobil, but more
24	importantly I am a lifelong
25	resident of Baton Rouge and



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1	Louisiana and my great
2	grandfather help bring standard
3	oil here to Baton Rouge. My
4	great uncle helped Southern
5	University locate on its current
6	location. So I am deeply
7	committed to the state and I
8	think what you guys are
9	considering today, these revised
10	rules is a huge step in the right
11	direction for predictability for
12	us.
13	As you have heard today from
14	several of our employees and from
15	Brad, and you-all know we are
16	considering a major project in
17	Baton Rouge, and we are looking
18	for that predictability to be
19	able to understand the cost of
20	investing in Louisiana versus
21	other places right now.
22	I would like to also say that
23	something that is not often
24	mentioned is what is happening in
25	the Gulf Coast with not just



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1	Exxon but other industry. It's a
2	huge time of growth, and we want
3	Louisiana to be able to compete
4	for that growth. We want more
5	projects to come here. Right now
6	I know a lot of focus is on jobs
7	and we are at max of simulation.
8	That means we are hiring to the
9	top level and we are hiring right
10	here in Baton Rouge but those are
11	going to be for jobs across the
12	Gulf Coast, so those jobs are
13	going to follow where the
14	investment goes. We want those
15	jobs to stay right here in
16	Louisiana.
17	And the last thing that I
18	will mention is that beyond the
19	direct economic impact that
20	investment can bring and that
21	extends to those contractor jobs
22	to even restaurants that benefit,
23	the local retailers, all of the
24	different suppliers and vendors
25	that benefit from investment. I



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1	think we also need to consider
2	what we can do with our local
3	communities as a partnership. A
4	lot of the rhetoric we have heard
5	has made economic development a
6	bad thing and it is not. It is a
7	very good thing and our local
8	communities need to understand
9	that they can benefit when we
10	bring investment here. Whether
11	it's the \$13 million we were able
12	to get to Louisiana to help our
13	teachers and help our school
14	system. We're expanding that
15	program this summer to extend to
16	800 teachers. Investment
17	project investment brings
18	community investment with it. We
19	want to do more in north Baton
20	Rouge. We want to do more for
21	our educators. We want to do
22	more for our community.
23	So, thank you, this is a
24	great step in the right direction
25	and let's keep moving forward for



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1	Louisiana.
2	MR. WINDHAM:
3	Thank you, Ms. Cargile. The
4	next we have Steve Nosacka.
5	MR. NOSACKA:
6	Good morning. I am Steve
7	Nosacka. I am the public affairs
8	manager for the town of Gramercy,
9	and also the grace of being able
10	to serve as mayor the last
11	several years, and also I served
12	St. James Parish as the economic
13	development consultant. I'm here
14	on behalf of our St. James Parish
15	elected officials to encourage
16	you and tell you that we
17	absolutely support these changes
18	especially in the stability that
19	we think this will bring and
20	continue to bring to our economic
21	development and also our
22	community development efforts.
23	We continue to appreciate in
24	value this that the changes
25	that these changes preserve the



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1	preserve and continue to give
2	our local stakeholders the final
3	say in our property tax dollars.
4	I heard a mayor say before or
5	several years back at the
6	capital, you know it's really
7	troubling when you have to come
8	to Baton Rouge for your money,
9	but for all that, which is why I
10	continue to support and encourage
11	you to adopt these changes that
12	allow us to have the final say
13	where our local property tax
14	dollars go. Again, we thank you
15	for this and God speed to you in
16	your efforts to get it
17	implemented.
18	MR. WINDHAM:
19	Thank you, Mayor Nosacka.
20	Robert Thompson.
21	MR. THOMPSON:
22	My name is Robert Thompson
23	and I am a life long resident of
24	Baton Rouge, and I want to say
25	that the changes that you bring



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1	forth are headed in the right
2	direction, but I would request
3	that you take a look at the
4	loopholes that Mr. Bagert and the
5	other lady from Together Baton
6	Rouge has brought forth as the
7	loopholes in this in these
8	changes and also Ms. Loop brought
9	forth the idea of education and
10	exempting East Baton Rouge Parish
11	School Board from the ITEP. I
12	personally have a daughter who is
13	a school teacher and she taught
14	here in East Baton Rouge Parish
15	for three years and finally had
16	to realize that she couldn't
17	sustain a decent livelihood of
18	her pay. The teachers here have
19	not received a raise in ten
20	years. She is in Atlanta now and
21	has received a raise every year
22	she's been there, so I'm
23	requesting those two things that
24	you take a look at the proposed
25	that we brought forward and also



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1	look at exempting East Baton
2	Rouge Parish from the rules.
3	Thank you.
4	MR. WINDHAM:
5	Thank you, Mr. Thompson.
6	That was the last of our comment
7	cards. Is anyone else with us
8	today that would like to step
9	forward? Please step forward and
10	fill a card for me afterward. I
11	am sorry. I don't have them. As
12	you said before, our first
13	meeting was seven hours and I
14	want people to have their
15	opportunity to express
16	themselves. So please step
17	forward and fill out the card
18	afterward and if for some reason
19	we don't have it so we have it in
20	the record.
21	MR. SMITH:
22	Ronald Smith. I'm chairman
23	of the board of the Baton Rouge
24	Economic Development District. I
25	think she has the card. And my



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1	executive director here, we were
2	both I could have easily said
3	ditto but there is a few
4	exceptions to the ditto. One is
5	that we are in support of the
6	economic development,
7	particularly and we have been
8	charged with the function of
9	developing Baton Rouge north.
10	It's been overlooked. Economic
11	development is going to
12	immediately is going to make or
13	break the north Baton Rouge area.
14	I'm a life long resident of Baton
15	Rouge but I did work for General
16	Motors at that time, which is the
17	largest corporation in America.
18	And if anybody knows what
19	happened to General Motors
20	several years ago what happened
21	to the City of Detroit, and I
22	strongly, as Dr. Melancon
23	mentioned, some of the other
24	industries in the rust belt, I
25	would sure not have to leave



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Baton Rouge as I did Detroit due
to the situation that happened
there.

4 Both my daughters have left the state because of the lack of 5 6 opportunity for them, but also as 7 we -- in the north Baton Rouge 8 region, we talked to barbers, 9 landscapers, all of those people 10 that have not been mentioned 11 here, all of those trickle down 12 jobs that are related to this and 13 not being counted. I think you 14 have to take those jobs into consideration. 15 There are two 16 YMCA's in this parish that bear the name of industrial business. 17 18 Actually, three. There is on the 19 westbank and there is an 20 ExxonMobil YMCA and it's one of those facilities that have been 21 22 able to open or operate without 23 the assistance of major millions of dollars in donations to drive 24 25 summer camps, swim programs and



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-	the like on a lot of these
1	the like, so a lot of these
2	things are not taken into
3	consideration under the dollars
4	that are counted, so we are in
5	support of economic development.
6	ITEP is just one of those
7	functions that help bring that
8	and I would like to yield the
9	remainder of my time to the
10	executive director.
11	MR. WINDHAM:
12	Thank you, Mr. Smith, but
13	we're going to give you a full
14	three minutes, too.
15	MR. JACOBS:
16	Rinaldi Jacobs. Of the Baton
17	Rouge North Economic Development
18	District.
19	In 1776 was the birth of this
20	nation. Also at that time Mr.
21	Addis misspoke, the wealth of the
22	nations was also created. Within
23	the dynamic of this republic and
24	the dynamic of economics both
25	have played an important crucial



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1	role in the development of this
2	democracy. It is without
3	compromise and with compromise
4	that this democracy will continue
5	thus applicable to these rules
6	while it is very, very important
7	and we understand we must have a
8	strong and vibrant democracy.
9	Equally as important is having a
10	strong economic base for our
11	communities.
12	Many of us have watched the
13	dis and you can put whatever
14	you want behind dis in north
15	Baton Rouge. Disinvestment,
16	disenfranchisement, dis and that
17	as we say in Morgan City where
18	I'm from in south Louisiana. I
19	work in the oil patch. I lost a
20	piece of one of my fingers in the
21	oil patch, so I'm very much
22	concerned with how industry
23	treats its citizens. By the same
24	token those jobs in the oil patch
25	allowed me to get two degrees



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1	from Southern University. It
2	allowed me to come back to
3	Louisiana and raise my two sons
4	here as opposed to a state of
5	Connecticut where we were living
6	for eight years. We came back
7	home. It is a difficult
8	challenge sometimes to tell young
9	people of this generation to
10	stay, raise your children and put
11	them in public schools. However,
12	my family has made that choice.
13	Not simply because Exxon is
14	there, my kids don't work for
15	those companies but they work for
16	other companies that are equally
17	as important to this city and the
18	stability of this parish. They
19	both went to public schools and
20	both graduated from Southern
21	University.
22	What's my point? The
23	industrial base in north Baton
24	Rouge is very, very crucial.
25	Isn't crucial as much as we call



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1	ourselves the blue collar part of
2	town as we do the medical parts,
3	we'll call them the lab coats,
4	and the downtown and governmental
5	area we'll just call those white
6	collar. No matter which collar
7	you wear or if you don't wear a
8	collar at all, we believe that
9	tax and training of workers is
10	equally as important as anything
11	else, so we as business leaders
12	are constantly bombarded with
13	this stability and
14	predictability, as a business
15	owner we need a stable workforce
16	and we need predictable taxes and
17	we need educated workforce and we
18	need compromise when it's time to
19	compromise. Compromise usually
20	means, as I was taught as a young
21	political scientist at Southern
22	University, is that nobody gets
23	everything that they want but
24	everybody gets something else
25	that they need, so work the



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1	rules, ladies and gentlemen, such
2	that the citizen, their tax
3	dollar benefit and there is
4	predictability for bids as well
5	as the many citizens of this city
6	and of this state and of north
7	Baton Rouge specifically, we not
8	only deserve it, we have to have
9	it. Thank you very much.
10	MR. WINDHAM:
11	Thank you, sir. Caroline S.
12	Mays.
13	MS. MAYS:
14	Yes.
15	MR. WINDHAM:
16	Sorry we missed you earlier.
17	MS. MAYS:
18	No problem. Good morning. My
19	name is Caroline Stampley Mays,
20	and I've held several positions
21	in my 19 years at ExxonMobil, and
22	my current role is project
23	procurement advisor of capital
24	investments to our Baton Rouge
25	complex.



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1	Baton Rouge is home for me.
2	I'm a product of the East Baton
3	Rouge Parish School System,
4	gifted and talented program. I
5	graduated from Scottlandville
6	Magnet High School engineering
7	program and I'm an alumna of
8	Southern University where I
9	obtained a degree in mechanical
10	engineering. I, like many of my
11	peers, left Louisiana after
12	graduating and started my
13	professional career with
14	ExxonMobil in Baytown, Texas. I
15	spent just shy of five years away
16	before an opportunity arose,
17	which allowed me to relocate
18	home. My husband is also a
19	native of Baton Rouge and a
20	physician who completed his
21	training abroad, but returned
22	back home to the community that
23	nursed him during his childhood.
24	My twin babies attend school here
25	and will be starting kindergarten



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1	in the fall, and my parents,
2	siblings and inloves {sic} which
3	I like to call them, my inlaws,
4	are all here in Baton Rouge as
5	well.
6	This proposal that you are
7	all considering is very personal
8	to me. I want to be here. I
9	want there to be more opportunity
10	in Baton Rouge so that I can stay
11	here, so that my husband can stay
12	here and so that my kids can stay
13	here, so that engineering
14	students that I recruit at
15	Southern University can stay here
16	and the many kids, especially
17	young girls, that I mentor in the
18	community can stay here as well.
19	The only way to bring opportunity
20	is capital investment, and in
21	order to bring investment, we
22	need predictability. I strongly
23	ask that you support LEDC
24	proposed new guidelines because
25	zero percent of zero is zero.



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1	Thank you-all for the opportunity
2	to speak.
3	MR. WINDHAM:
4	Thank you, Ms. Mays. All
5	right. One last bite at the
6	apple.
7	Are there any other comments
8	that any other individuals
9	that would like to come forward
10	and make comments? Do you have a
11	card? Please identify yourself.
12	MR. COPESKY:
13	Jeff Copesky. I am with
14	ExxonMobil. I wasn't going to
15	come up here but my references to
16	the people wearing clothes and
17	not wearing clothes and being
18	straight forward, my wife is in
19	the public school system and
20	she's to lay at the feet of
21	ITEP, the problems that we are
22	facing in our public school
23	system is just simply
24	disingenuous and opportunistic.
25	I hear every day what's going on



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1 in the school system, and I can 2 tell you what we need are people creating jobs, encouraging them 3 4 to create jobs. I was looking at the handout 5 6 here that says two of every three 7 property tax dollars collected at 8 the capital region come from In addition business 9 industry. 10 and industry pays 50 percent of all state -- of sales taxes 11 12 collected in the state. T think 13 we need to be growing instead of 14 dividing. We do need to be 15 together, but we need to be 16 working together for solutions that better everybody, and I 17 18 think I'm left with the --19 another parable, and that's 20 killing the goose that lays the 21 golden eggs. I'm not saying that 22 we're perfect, but we are out 23 there trying to grow the state, 24 bringing more geese to this state 25 so we are all lifted up at the



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same time, and I would just say I resent the divisiveness, I regret
resent the divisiveness, I regret
it, and I just don't think we
should be the pinata for the
problems of the state. Thank you
very much.
MR. WINDHAM:
Thank you, Mr. Copesky. All
right. So that was the last one.
Do we have any other
questions or comments by any of
the board members concerning any
of the rules? Don, unless you
have a question, I was going to
go over there. No. Any other
questions by any of the board
members?
All right. So I'm going to
give a quick highlight of the
upcoming dates and deadlines at
the highest of levels June 22nd
is the deadline to submit the
written comments. June 25th, LED
will hold a public bearing
will hold a public hearing



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1	Procedures Act. Everyone is
2	invited to that meeting. And
3	then on June 27th the C&I's
4	regular board meeting to will
5	include consideration of the
6	proposed changes. On the
7	department's website, I believe
8	we have this. This. Okay. So
9	this is a very detailed proposed
10	timeline for promulgation for
11	Industrial Tax Exemption rules.
12	May 10th activity has occurred.
13	May 20th has occurred. I just
14	mentioned the June 22nd meeting.
15	I just mentioned the June 25th
16	meeting. On the 27th, again,
17	we'll deliberate and consider the
18	proposed rules. The target date
19	for summary report oversight
20	committee because these rules
21	have to go to the oversight
22	committee of the house committee
23	on commerce would be easier
24	with glasses house committee
25	on commerce and city committee on



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1	commerce and international
2	affairs is targeted for June
3	29th. Assuming we go through
4	that successfully with these
5	proposed rules. From July 5th
6	through July 30th will be the
7	timeframe with possible
8	legislative oversight committee
9	hearings could occur. August
10	20th will be the final rule
11	publishing and Louisiana Register
12	and the effective date of the new
13	rules should they go forward.
14	So that kind of gives us a
15	timeline of those activities.
16	Are there any questions by any of
17	the board members concerning the
18	proposed timeline? Any questions
19	from the public? With that, I
20	will invite the secretary to give
21	comments.
22	MR. PIERSON:
23	I just, for the record, want
24	to make sure that we correctly
25	identified things. I do have a



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1	copy of a letter from St. Mary
2	Parish dated 15 May regarding the
3	ITEP rule changes in which St.
4	Mary Parish in general sports the
5	changes to the ITEP rule process
6	but I think they want to clarify
7	their position they do not
8	support but recommend changes for
9	consideration. I will also note
10	that we have received a few more
11	letters this morning. I continue
12	to log those letters into our
13	system. We will make them
14	available via PDF, and that
15	inventory I anticipate will
16	continue to grow through the
17	closure of the written comment
18	period on 22 June, but I just
19	wanted the record to correctly
20	reflect the position of St. Mary
21	Parish.
22	MR. WINDHAM:
23	Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
24	With that, I don't know if we
25	need a motion for adjournment but



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1	I will receive one.
2	MR. JONES:
3	So move.
4	MR. WINDHAM:
5	Made by Mr. Jones. Seconded
6	by Mr. Miller. All in favor
7	indicate with an aye.

13	everyone turning up today.
